SUBJECT: Public Services Report – July 2024

Library Services Manager – Paulina Aguirre-Clinch

July has been a quiet month with regularly scheduled one-on-one meetings with managers as well as affinity team meetings. I offered some support in administrative duties related to the hiring of librarian I's and the strategic planning of community engagement services.

Library Services Manager – Ken Zambos

This month, I have met with managers and staff from the libraries I directly support, to find ways to improve service to the public while positively contributing to staff workflow. As a member of the Presenter Planning Team, I have worked with the team to refine processes related to systemwide paid presenter events. These efforts are meant to streamline expenditure reporting and provide tools for improved budget oversight. Additionally, I have been working to enhance our internship partnership with the University of Arizona, which we expect to see take shape in the month of August. Lastly, I have continued to work as a member of the Library Administration Team to help with the planning and implementation of our organizational goals.

Library Services Manager – Alina Rowe

This month, I met with my managers one on one at our monthly meetings. I was also able to provide support to the records office by opening the Oro Valley Branch early to let them into the building. I worked with library administration and the records office to get the Oro Valley Branch open to get early voting on its way. I attended the Nuestras Raices, and Many Nations monthly meetings. We started the work to organize the annual Community Food Bank Auction.

Library Services Manager – Vicki Lázaro

Continuing to provide support in-person and with Teams video check-ins with the Managers of Murphy-Wilmot, Miller-Golf Links, Dusenberry-River, Wheeler Taft Abbett Sr. and Santa Rosa Libraries.

Supporting administration and assisting branches by attending and/or participating in the Vulnerable Populations Team, Collaborative Action Team, Policy Review Team, PRIDE Affinity Team, Nuestras Raices, Library Planning Task Force and Public Service Manager Meetings. In

addition, I have been working with the Public Services team in recommending placements of newly interviewed Librarian 1s.

This month I also took some vacation leave and enjoyed Las Conchas beach time.

District 1 – Supervisor Rex Scott

Dusenberry-River Library – Mikel Stone

July at Dusenberry-River Branch Library has been steadily busy despite school being out and our winter visitors summering elsewhere. We have been host to a steady flow of Tucson children and youth looking for summer reading and joining in our Summer of Learning offerings. Notable events include a very well-attended event hosted by staff from the Reid Park Zoo, a Fan Fiction workshop, and a series of Crochet get-togethers. We are also an official Voting site and we'll be hosting County Recorder staff as they operate a voting site from our meeting room.

Nanini Library – Caitlin Burns

When Nanini summer programs reach meeting room capacity, our youth services team offer craft activities in the Children's area with the help of teen volunteers. Families who would have normally been turned away from the program are now staying engaged at the library.

Nanini's citizenship classes, in partnership with Pima Community College, resumed this month. A former student stopped by the class to tell our instructor that they are now a citizen!

Nanini library was the hot spot for teens to volunteer this summer with over 320 hours of volunteer time given. These teens all made a huge impact on our community doing everything from walking children through different crafts to answering questions about technology. Also in July we hosted a teen intern who worked 30 hours per week. This was his first job experience, and he was able to learn about responsibility, self-direction, communication, and other skills in a supportive environment.

We also had two adult volunteers in July - one who volunteered 20 hours to meet a requirement for her degree in education, and another who volunteered 8.5 hours to help us when staffing was low.

Oro Valley Public Library – Kaitlyn Sparks

In July we experienced several partial day closures and warm temperatures in the afternoon through evening for most of the month due to needing AC unit repairs. Staff have been working diligently to help patrons with library services through the heat. Despite these difficulties, we were able to continue several of our Summer Learning presentations for families, which included a visit from the Reid Park Zoo, Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum, and even a musical storytime with Mamma Coal.

Oro Valley was also a voting site for Early Voting, which started July 15, two Emergency Voting days, and Election Day on July 30. Voting always brings more customers to the library, quite a few of whom stop by to get a library card. Staff were happy to welcome them to the library and help them discover what new library services we have to offer!

District 2 – Supervisor Matt Heinz

Eckstrom-Columbus Library – Kelly Wilson

We had a wonderful turnout for our annual Preschool Storytime Graduation celebration. The graduates all got a personalized certificate and made themselves a red graduation cap to wear. There were treats and stories and all kinds of fun to wish the children well on their way to kindergarten. We have had rave reviews for our in-house scavenger hunt. The locations get changed every day so families can play the scavenger hunt over and over. A family came in and

their child wanted to play a game, but the parents said they didn't have enough time. One of our librarians offered them the scavenger hunt and this made both child and parents very happy.

Our Job Help crew hosted a Goodwill Job Help Seminar that was very appreciated and well attended. They helped people with interviewing skills, resumés and job-hunting tips. We hope to have them back in the future. Our monthly book club and yoga program have both found their following and are always well attended.

We continue to provide Cooling Station relief to many folks in our community. They are always very grateful for the comfortable cool environment as well as the water bottles, sunscreen and other amenities we can offer. The Medical Reserve Corps of Southern Arizona spent a week tabling in support of our Cooling Station, and it was nice to have their expertise to share with the community.

Quincie Douglas Library – Lois Miller

Sahuarita Library – Betsy Langley

We held a Chess Tournament with presenter Martha Underwood on Saturday, July 6! There were four rounds with 28 participants competing for the championship. The top five players received trophies and all participants went home with a chess pawn key chain. We also gave away some library goodies and had pizza during the break. In between rounds, kids were given a chess challenge on the board to try to figure out while they waited for the next round. They really seemed to enjoy these puzzles, which is a good way to build new skills.

Families hung out in the library where we had lots of other activities happening, including Board Game Extravaganza, Giant Games on the patio, and coloring and crafting tables. Toddlers got to build with mega blocks in the Storytime room and we were inspired to turn this into a regular program.

We're wrapping up Summer Learning with some fun programs, including Frank from the Comic Bookmobile, who taught kids how to draw and design their own characters. We're also doing some jewelry making and having a Superhero Costume Contest on Friday, July 19 to prepare for MegaMania. Our Children's and Teen Librarians are also helping with the closing event!

A local group of adults with disabilities visits the library regularly, so we thought we'd put together an adult Storytime program for them. They had a blast reading stories about frogs and created their own froggie craft to take home. It was a huge success and we hope to do it again!

Sam Lena–South Tucson Library – Lu Guerrero

In July, the library resumed ELAA classes, in partnership with Literacy Connects. The class will meet twice a week at the library, until late August. The class season kicked off with twelve students in attendance. The library also partnered, in late June, with the Medical Reserve Corps of Southern AZ to provide heat-related illness information and assistance to customers experiencing symptoms. Volunteers were present to provide water bottles, ice packs and electrolyte packets to community members.

Library staff facilitated weekly Crafternoon activities, Storytimes and Code Club through July. Youth enthusiastically participated in button-making, jewelry and wirework crafting, and coding activities. The library's Youth Services Librarian also participated in this year's end-of-summer-reading event, MegaMania.

Santa Rosa Library – Heather Severson

The Santa Rosa Library Staff continue to hear appreciation from Patrons of all ages who express joy and gratitude to be back in the Library after the two-month closure. One young patron said, "This library is my home!" Community partner Barbara Valenzuela from Head Start sent a letter of appreciation and brought a lovely plant to celebrate the reopening. Many patrons have also expressed gratitude for the Library's participation as cooling centers in our community.

Library Associate Cintia R. was interviewed by the Green Valley News as a recipient of the Friends of The Green Valley Library's generous scholarship for MLIS students at the University of Arizona College of Information Science. The article, "GV Library Friends Award Scholarships, Assist System," was published on July 7, 2024.

This month's Library programs include two STEAM programs, AZ Health Zone Nutrition, Storytime, Cosmic Painting, Wonders of Space, and Desert Reptiles. Elma S. conducted outreach for Head Start children and families, and the Library hosted two Head Start promotion celebrations. Two staff members from SRO are participating in MegaMania this year. Staff professional development this month includes training from the Food Bank of Southern Arizona, and Gardening 101 training from The Garden Kitchen.

District 3 – Dr. Sylvia M. Lee

Caviglia-Arivaca Library – Jodi Ohlson

This has been the busiest summer I've seen since I started working at the Caviglia Arivaca Library. Part of that of course is how fortunate we are to have Teen Interns, Denalli and Jasmine, working alongside our temporary Page Ulysses this month. Additionally, Library Technical Supervisor Madian, has tenaciously expanded our Teen Advisory Board (TAB), as she introduces herself and the benefits of volunteering at the library to every teen she can locate. As a team we have been able to juggle Summer Learning at the Arivaca Community Center, outreach events with local community partners, and additional programming at the library. This has been the "...do all the things summer" of all summers.

For July's *Summer Learning Wednesdays*, we enjoyed visits from Emy who taught us about a different animal every week. July's lucky visitors were chickens, rabbits, goats, desert tortoises, and bearded dragons. We received an urgent request for more Summer Learning titles about animals, because after Emmy's presentation the children wanted more books featuring the animals that came to visit. Every Saturday, Librarian Merrilee, offered a variety of programs ranging from story times, and crafts, to obstacle courses and scavenger hunts. Our TAB group offered helping hands for several of the programs, in addition to celebrating their second anniversary with root beer floats and a presentation highlighting their accomplishments of the past year. We especially honored Skye, our first TAB graduate. Skye is moving to Tucson to attend Pima Community College, and his enthusiasm and innate joy of debating everything will be missed.

All of our Summer Learning programs have an intergenerational reach, and some of our summer learning programs are intended primarily for adults. COPE Community Services brought a program discussing Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) for outpatient home based addiction treatment. Green Valley Assistance League offered in home fall assessments with their Safety and Health in Motion class aimed at seniors. Our ongoing groups : Book Club, Fiber Arts Friday, Poetry Club, Art Salon, and Reading Hour for Book Club Non-Conformists, have all seen a bit of a summer dip in attendance due to the snowbirds flying north, and the extreme heat of this time of the year.

Flowing Wells Library – Angie Grischkowsky

July has been a whirlwind month, with lots of unexpected challenges, from storms to computer and systems outages, and more. And it's also been business as usual for Flowing Wells Library. Toddler/Preschool and Baby Storytimes have each continued to attract new faces! The library gets very busy each Tuesday and Wednesday when Storytime lets out, with lots of children and families spending time together, checking out Culture Passes, and loading up on another week's worth of books. Read to a Dog has seen Winston, our newest addition to our lineup of Celebrity Dogs, settle in and grow his own fan club.

Crochet and Knitting Club for teens & adults has retained its popularity among a core group of crafters each week, and we were also thrilled to welcome back Beginning and Intermediate English language learners for the summer quarter of English classes from our friends at Literacy Connects! Other patrons often comment on how full the parking lot is when English classes are happening.

Summer Learning Events rounded out our fabulous roster for this month, including: 5th of July STEAM Party, Art Testing for Kids, Bad Art Party for tweens and teens, Mario Kart Game Day, Zoo to You featuring Reid Park Zoo, Teen Movie Day, and our annual Bubble Party at the end of the month.

Salazar-Ajo Library – Daniela Buchberger

In response to community needs the library now offers one additional hour of services to ensure the most vulnerable population of Ajo can cool off during the high temperatures this summer. Additionally, the library began to provide support for the weekend cooling station at Walker Park Community Center. Library staff furnished the cooling station with tables and activities for guests.

The partnership with the Health Department continued with the Be There campaign, providing Naloxone, Fentanyl Test Strips, Gun Locks and Covid-Tests to members of the Ajo Community. Teens and young adults have come to the library to obtain their gift cards after successfully completing peer mental health support training. Additionally, the library will be a host to Health Department Outreach in the upcoming months.

Staff from the Salazar Ajo Library provided outreach and distributed Summer Learning Books to communities on the Western Tohono O'odham Reservation and have begun creating new library cards, distributing hotspots and teaching new customers how to access library materials, including electronic resources.

The library hosted a workshop for families by Disability Rights Arizona in which participants learned about the rights to accommodations and modifications for students with disabilities and special needs. The community requested more trainings on these subjects and future trainings will be scheduled in the fall.

The library space serves as an Early Voting and Emergency Voting site through the Pima County Recorder's Office.

Much fun was had during our regularly scheduled Whatever Wednesday afternoon programming, Family Story Time on Friday mornings and Lego Club on Wednesday mornings.

Wheeler Taft Abbott, Sr. Library – Sam Hennig

In July, Children's services staff had Reid Park Zoo present Zoo to You for our community, and we quickly reached room capacity and everyone had a great time. During the summer we scaled back our Homework Help program to two days per week, and in July we added fun board and card games that involve use of math and reading into the mix.

Teen Services has had a great July continuing to provide teens the opportunity to volunteer. We hosted more 3D printing sessions to teach more of the public how 3D printing works. We hosted a VR program with the Meta Quest 2 system that had some technical difficulties but was well attended enough that several participants said they would be more likely to look for similar programs during the school year and filled out summer learning surveys that say the same. A lot of staff and volunteer time has gone into preparation for the Megamania Event happening on July 20th with some teens finalizing their volunteer hours for the event and a few adult volunteers stepping in to help prep craft materials. Staff are now working on winding down Summer Learning activities and transitioning instead into preparation for the school year beginning and the return to more dedicated after school programming as well an anticipated attendance for Homework Help programming. Our last program of July will be a party to celebrate the contributions of the teen volunteers over the summer and a final reminder that more volunteer opportunities are available during the rest of the year such as Teen Advisory Board and committed shelving volunteering.

Tween Services in July has been completely intertwined with Teen Services. Those who are officially too young to volunteer have come to the library to meet up with their volunteering friends providing the volunteers an opportunity to host crafts geared to the interests of their tween cohorts using the passive programming materials available to them. The Tween Space we established at the beginning of Summer is showing increased popularity as a place for youth to sit and use the library's provided board games out of the flow of younger patron traffic that fills the children's room. Tweens have also attended 3D printing sessions and have enjoyed the passive robotics programming run by the teen volunteers. Direct from teen volunteer advertising of Megamania to tween patrons has increased the awareness of the event for that age-range and we hope that results in more attendance of the Megamania program on July 20th.

Adult services staff had an origami program where attendees got to make several different paper crafts. Abbett was also very excited to welcome our new Library Program Instruct who will be assisting with Job Help and Computer Instruction. This program will be very beneficial for our community.

Woods Memorial Library – Chinyere Olumba

"If I had my way, I'd remove January from the calendar altogether and have an extra July instead."

In the Continuation of Summer Learning programming in July! Woods Memorial had the *Center for Neuroscience with You and Your Brain* that attracted 16 patrons on July 3rd, On July 10th at 3pm we had Homemade Playdough with *Estrella Creates* which wooed 25 patrons, the *Family Improv show with Unscrewed Theatre* on July 13th engaged 9 patrons, and lastly the *Afro-Brazilian Music program with Pogo Arts* on the 18th, charmed 16 patrons. And as of July 18th, Woods Memorial has signed up over 500 young patrons for Summer Learning.



Woods Memorial also showed the movie, *Angels in the Outfield* with popcorn on July 15th at 3pm which attracted 6 patrons. We also had our Maker's Mayem activity on July 17th which allowed 15 patrons to turn terracotta flowerpots into flowerpot people.

Also at Wood Memorial, *Literacy Connects* was able to have a summer English language and a Spanish computer class in which both classes have been able to excite a total of 22 patrons weekly. We have continued our snack program through the summer and in July we gave out 225 packets.

District 4 – Supervisor Steve Christy

W. Anne Gibson-Esmond Station – Mary McKinney

A woman told library staff that her kids were so great at the dentist's office that she asked them what they wanted as a reward for their good behavior. They said they wanted an extra day at the library!

At Treats & Titles- Kids Edition on July 10 attendees and their parents enjoyed treats while they heard about a bevy of books to add to their reading lists.

In conjunction with the summer reading program, the summer Pokémon scavenger hunt was played over 1000 times by the time it ended on July 16!

Joyner-Green Valley Library – Heather Tyndall

The pace may move a little slower in the community of Green Valley in the summer, but the Joyner-Green Valley Library remained a popular destination in July. Folks came in from the heat to pick up their reserved items, read one of the hundred or so magazines and newspapers available, attend our weekly *Mindfulness Meditation* program, or discuss *The Light Pirate*, during this month's meeting of the Page Turner's Book Club. For our youngest patrons, *Family Storytime* continued to be a big draw, followed by doing the scavenger hunt in the Children's Area as well as choosing books and DVDs to enjoy at home.

In two separate, three-hour classes, different groups of adult patrons animatedly engaged in a perfect summertime activity for the cool indoors: learning how to play American Mah Jongg. The instructor gave some history of the game, highlighting differences from its Asian counterpart, explained the significance of the many different tiles, and then taught participants how to play. There was much good-natured ribbing as these newest students of the game gave each other pointers while the instructor moved among the four-player tables coaching participants.

Miller-Golf Links Library – Anna Lawrence

July at the Miller-Golf Links library has been filled with programs and learning. The hot weather has brought in many patrons looking for indoor activities. Although we lost our LPI in a transfer to another branch, and in happening have lost multiple job and technology help one-on-one sessions, another staff member has offered to provide one session of job and tech assistance once per week. GLF is hosting a summer session of GED prep classes taught by volunteers from Literacy Connects. So far, the sessions have been well received by those who attended.

For children's programs in July, we have had Lego Day, DIY bath bombs, cryptid craft day, learning about birds in the Sonoran Desert, a bead making workshop, and a special guest story time as well as our usual story times! Teens have had some of their own programs including making Origami Monsters, crafting Mothman from a sock, and tween/teen Book vs Movie club. Adults could attend How to Write Your Memoir, Everyday Tools to Manage Stress, Watercolor and Salt Art, Draw Your Favorite Sonoran Desert Bird, and our monthly book club.

Murphy-Wilmot Library – Kathy Konecny

Customers of all ages loved Murphy-Wilmot's summer programming schedule. Over 700 children signed up for our children's Summer Learning Program, 82 children participated in a community collage project, and 150 children enjoyed Grab and Go learning activities. Our Babytimes had as many as 75 participants and our Family Storytimes' largest attendance was 57. Lego Club was a big hit with as many as 78 participants in one of the sessions. In one afternoon, the Pima County Health Department handed out 90 Health Kits, gave 5 COVID vaccinations, and saw 16 patients in their mobile clinic. We had 11 teens and 1 adult involved in our volunteer program helping with tasks ranging from staffing the Summer Learning Table, shelving books, and assisting with children's programs. Finally, our beginner English Class filled to capacity the first day of registration.

Murphy-Wilmot was able to do three outreach activities in July. Our Children's Librarian visited Anshei Israel's preschool class, presented a storytime to 3 of Udall Center's Kidco groups, and participated in the Adventure School's family afternoon.

District 5 – Supervisor Adelita Grijalva, Chair

Frank De La Cruz-El Pueblo Library – John Muñoz

El Pueblo Library continued our partnership with the El Pueblo Activity Center, bringing two extremely well attended presentations to participants of the City of Tucson's KIDCO summer program. There were so many attendees for the live hedgehogs (70 to see only two hedgehogs!) that we adjusted our crowd control for the miniature horse (100!) so that the animals and presenters didn't get overwhelmed. We're very pleased to be able to bring exciting programming to kids in this neighborhood through the use of these larger locations. Back at the branch, bilingual Storytime continues to have an average of 25 attendees, and we're starting to see new families attend regularly.

Himmel Park Library – Heather Ross

As part of Summer Learning, Himmel Park Library hosted a scavenger hunt, posting one new clue per week and leaving up the old ones so it is possible to do the whole thing all at once. We highlighted different areas of the library for kids to discover, like the animal books, graphic novels, the seed library, and more. We also encouraged the kids to ask desk staff for help, hoping to get them comfortable with coming to us when they have questions. Children of all ages have been having a lot of fun exploring the library, and we often see parents working together with their children.

Himmel Park Library received a postcard in the mail announcing a new book release. Here's what the postcard said: "Dear Friends, I grew up at Himmel Park Library! It made me a reader and a writer and now my first book is coming out wide. THANK YOU for helping launch me. I am so grateful!" And we, in turn, are so honored to have played a small part in this author's career!

Valencia Library – Ivonne Ramirez

We hosted a mini-mega theme this month during Teen Time and Create club. Using paper arts, and fabric arts, sewing machines and a lot of imagination, the youth created costumes, capes, masks, and accessories. It was an engaging creative theme to lead into the feature event for the library system MegaMania at Pima Community College.

New programs we tested this month are Garden Hour and Retro gaming. Garden hour featured activities for kids, relaxing and quiet outdoor seating for adults, and an opportunity to tend to the garden and learn about the seed library. It was a wonderful opportunity to share the garden projects with the library visitors and discover something new to enjoy at the library. Retro gaming was a chill space for youth to hang out and geek out with snacks and old gaming favorites on the PS2, including rock band, and guitar hero. Youth of all ages hung out and had fun in the teen zone and the 101 space.

Library staff are gearing up for the back-to-school programming and have already confirmed visits to schools and partner organizations for August from the program team and the bookmobile. We are looking forward to the next school year and to new adventures with our community-driven programming at Valencia Library!
