SUBJECT: Director and Support Services Report – March 2025

Grant Funding – IMLS (Institute for Museum and Library Services) was included in an unprecedented executive order that will effectively diminish the IMLS as an agency. The Urban Libraries Council (ULC) will be working with other library-related associations to craft a joint statement. They will hold informational sessions to make government leaders who may not be aware of the challenges of reduced funding given all the issues communities around the country face.

Library Survey -

Preliminarily more than 12,000 surveys were started online with a 62% completion rate. Final analysis will be shared as soon as all paper surveys have been tallied.

IMLS Funding – complied by Beth Matthias-Loghry, Library Services Manager

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) provides \$3,566,322.00 to Arizona libraries through its Grants to States program, with approximately \$900,000 distributed annually through competitive LSTA grants via the Arizona State Library. This funding supports essential services including the Writers in Residence program, professional development, the Arizona Memory Project, and specialized community initiatives.

IMLS funding directly impacts our library through programs addressing literacy, youth development, digital access, and services for underserved populations. Notable projects include Community Based Science Kits, Remote Access Lockers implemented during COVID-19, and initiatives supporting historically marginalized communities.

State Grants in Aid funding, which supports programs like the Tucson Festival of Books, is awarded from the Arizona Legislature so the state can qualify for Federal IMLS funding.

If IMLS funding were reduced or eliminated, the impact could reach hundreds of thousands of dollars, affecting both direct services and access to state-level resources. Community members can support IMLS funding by contacting their representatives, sharing personal stories about library impact, and actively using library services. FAQ

What is IMLS?

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) is a federal agency that provides vital funding through grants to strengthen libraries and museums across the United States.

How much IMLS funding does Arizona receive?

The Arizona State Library receives \$3,566,322.00 through the IMLS Grants to States program. Of this amount, approximately \$900,000.00 passes through the Arizona State Library through competitive Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grants to libraries across the state.

What programs does IMLS fund in Arizona?

IMLS funding supports a broad range of initiatives including LSTA grants, scholarship programs, professional development opportunities, staff training, E-Rate support, the Arizona Memory Project, Connect Arizona Digital Navigators, and participation in the Collaborative Library Summer Program.

How does IMLS funding impact our library specifically?

Our library has received consistent IMLS funding for programs including Writers in Residence, Southwest Books of the Year community science initiatives, digital access improvements, and specialized services for underserved populations. The funding also supports critical professional development for our staff.

What would happen if IMLS funding were reduced or eliminated?

The potential impact could be in hundreds of thousands of dollars. Programs like Writers in Residence, specialized outreach services, and professional development opportunities would be at risk. Additionally, we might lose access to state-level resources that are funded through IMLS.

Is State Grant in Aid funding connected to IMLS?

Yes, State Grants in Aid funding (which supports the Tucson Festival of Books and has supported construction projects at the Sam Lena South Tucson Library) is required by the Arizona Legislature for the state to qualify for Federal IMLS funding. The two funding streams are interconnected.

How are decisions about IMLS funding made?

IMLS funding is determined by Congressional appropriations. Funding levels are established through the federal budget process and can be influenced by advocacy from library supporters, community members, and elected officials.

How do libraries get LSTA grants?

Libraries across Arizona compete for approximately \$900,000.00 in LSTA grant funding that passes through the Arizona State Library. These competitive grants fund innovative programs and services that address specific community needs and priorities.

Specific Examples of IMLS Grant Benefits

Writers in Residence Program (2016-2024)

This decade-long program has brought professional writers like Logan Philips, Meg Files, and Tom Holm to our libraries, offering free consultations, workshops, and educational opportunities for aspiring writers in our community. The program has served thousands of community members and helped launch numerous writing careers.

Library Collections: Evaluation to Access (2019)

This project evaluated library collections across all library locations and the bookmobile to identify acquisition gaps, ensuring that collections met the diverse and evolving needs of the communities served.

Library Outpost at the Pima County Juvenile Court Center (2019)

This project transformed library services for high-risk adjudicated youth by establishing a library outpost within the Pima County Juvenile Court Center, providing targeted resources and support.

Community Based Science Kits (2021)

These kits allowed community members to participate in real scientific research, collecting valuable data for scientists while learning about scientific methods. The program demonstrated that science is accessible to everyone and potentially opened new career paths for participants of all ages.

Remote Access Lockers (2021)

During the COVID-19 pandemic, IMLS funding enabled us to quickly adapt to community needs by installing contactless pickup lockers. This innovation ensured continued access to physical materials when in-person services were limited, demonstrating our ability to respond to crisis situations.

Our Story - Communities of Color Curation Project (2021)

This project empowered historically underserved Black community members whose history had been excluded from Pima County and Arizona archives. The initiative preserved valuable cultural heritage and gave voice to marginalized communities, creating a more inclusive historical record.

Youth Health Action Fund (2022)

This initiative addressed mental and physical health challenges facing youth in high-poverty areas through literacy, arts, and advocacy opportunities. The program demonstrated how libraries can be partners in community health initiatives, particularly for vulnerable populations.

101Space Valencia Library (2020)

This learning lab for young adults provided innovative opportunities for skill development and creativity. The space has become a hub for youth engagement, offering technological access and mentorship that might otherwise be unavailable to many participants.

Social Services-focused Program Consultation Services (2024)

Our newest IMLS-funded initiative is developing specialized programs to address mental health, substance use, and poverty-related issues while providing support to library staff working with high-needs patrons. This project demonstrates our commitment to holistic community service and staff development.

Competitive LSTA Grant Process
